



MEXICO OUTREACH UPDATE

This January, members of Pioneer Bible Church's Mexico Outreach team headed south again! Below, Janet Marsh shares the details of their adventure with the rest of the congregation:

At 3am, Saturday morning, January 5, 2013, 11 of us met in the Pioneer Bible church office to do the last minute 3 P's-- paperwork, packing, and prayer—before leaving sharply at 4am for San Felipe Mexico. We made good time getting to San Felipe in a SUV and an RV (ask those who travelled in the RV how they had to suffer on the ride down & back!), even after a stop to pick up one more team member, gas, dinner at Walmart just before crossing the international border, and a full search of the RV at the border and again at the police checkpoint just before San Felipe.

John and Bonnie were gracious hosts, and had a lot of work ready for our team to accomplish during the week. We put up drywall & taped a church ceiling, primed & painted the whole 2nd floor of the Serenity House, installed gutters around the 99+1 compound, cleaned out a garage for a local couple who needed help, and did various odd jobs.

We ran a VBS for local children for 2 days of the week (one day was rained out). We were fueled 3 times a day plus a dessert time by our own Jay Miser, who cooked and cleaned up after meals for us. We were blessed every evening by a time with John and Bonnie, where they shared their lives and the lives of the Serenity House residents with us, and encouraged us in the word. Every evening we had a campfire and sang worship songs together—and made smores a couple evening—even though it was quite cold this trip. Also John took us to visit the locations where earlier Pioneer Bible Church teams have done work—Recovery Center, Orphanage, Medical Center, elevator for Bonnie churches, etc. It was special for those of us who have only heard about the prior work to actually see what is there now, after all the hard work has been done.

We have always gone to a Mexican Sunday church service while there on past trips. This was the first time we actually had an English interpreter for us so that we could fully participate! It helped us to make a special connection to the local people, as we participated in their communion service. The Mexican church congregation then invited us to stay for lunch with them after the service, where we were served local dishes. A special unforgettable highlight for every one of us was the Wednesday evening service at the church we were putting a ceiling on.

MEAL FOR MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITY LACKING PERMANENT SHELTER

On the afternoon of Wednesday, January 23rd, a free lunch was provided at Pioneer Bible Church for residents of the south county who are either homeless, or lack an adequate or permanent shelter. The meal was prepared by Nicole Savage, Michele Holliday, Priscilla Jeuchter, Cindy McLeran, Jacquie Henefin, and Diana Wall under the supervision of the head of the church's benevolence committee, Pat Mann. The menu consisted of meatloaf, corn in butter sauce, potato wedges, garlic bread, and apple-crisp. An anonymous census was taken, to better understand what needs the residentially-challenged population in our county may have. Each guest left with a bag of groceries.

Jacquie Henifin's QUINOA A L'ORANGE SALAD

- 2 cups water
- 1 cup quinoa, rinsed well
- 1 cup grape tomatoes, halved
- ¼ cup diced celery
- 2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
- ¼ cup orange juice
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- ½ tsp grated orange rind
- ¼ tsp sea salt
- fresh black ground pepper, to taste

Bring water to boil in a small saucepan. Add quinoa. Return to a boil and simmer until water is absorbed, approximately 15 minutes. Remove from heat and cool in a mixing bowl. Mix together with quinoa. In a separate bowl, whisk together remaining ingredients to make dressing. Pour over salad and toss well to combine.

Ready in 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings. 200 calories per serving.
