Veteran's Appreciation Breakfast







"I really think the lesson about having good friends meant the most to me." - Ben Dean


"I think the highlight of the getaway was praying over Doug and making new friends." - David Richards

Nancy Mack explains how PBC has been involved in Angel Tree: "Angel Tree is a program under the umbrella of Prison Fellowship Ministry, and our church participated for about 20 years! wouldn't have believed that, but time does seem to fly by. I remember delivering gifts with my daughters when they were growing up! It is a ministry dedicated to families I believe helping to make sure children of a mom or dad in prison are not forgotten, and to let them know that their parent loves them. important, it is not just a gift to an impoverished child or family, in fact that may not even be the case. It is a gift from the parent for that child, in an effort to provide something they can use and to share their love. inmates must complete an application to participate in the program, they don't simply sign up, it does take some effort on their part





"So our part in this at Pioneer Bible Church is to come along side and provide these gifts for the kids. It takes many hands to do this work, from Vicki Butler who numbers the applications (and transfers the personal message each parent writes on the application to their child to the angel), to phone callers who obtain gift request information, table volunteers for angel sign-outs, purchasers, gift wrappers, and finally deliverers! Our church has done a Wonderful job supporting this ministry along with others during this special time of year, and we want to thank you for all you do."

Russian Tea Cakes



Mix thoroughly: 1 cup soft butter

1/2 cup powdered sugar

1 teaspoon Vanilla

Sift together and stir in: 2 1/4 cup sifted flour

1/4 teaspoon salt

Mix in: 3/4 cup finely chopped nuts

~Chill dough. roll into 1 inch balls. Place on un-greased baking sheet (cookies do not spread) Bake until set, but not brown. While still warm, roll in powdered sugar. Cool completely, then roll in powdered sugar again. Store in sealed container at room temperature. (Does not freeze well...gets gooey when defrosted!) Temperature: 400 F. Time: Bake 10 to 12 minutes. Amount: About 4 dozen 1 "cookies.
